The Mission's at Home and In Us: Unity in Diversity

Abstract: The story of the Good News proclaimed by our Lord Jesus calls us to 'proclaim the Gospel to all nations' (Mark 16:15). But how does this command translate to the Mission in our Archdiocese today? Given the multi-cultural nature of the Church in the Archdiocese, it has never been more opportune to ask the following questions in the way we can mission outwards - not only in a physical manner outside of the diocese, but within:

- What can all the different cultures offer in terms of gifts and talents that improves the home environment we live in?

- How can we embrace all cultural diversity, yet move and breathe in the One Body of Christ?

- How do we spiritually and pastorally discern with one heart the message of the Gospel, to allow the Good News, and address the spiritual needs of each unique individual in our Archdiocesan community?

This workshop will include an introduction to some common liturgical hymns in other languages, not exclusively but including Te Reo himene and waiata.



Christopher Longhurst is a theologian trained in the Roman system. He holds a doctorate in theology *summa cum laude* from the Angelicum, Rome. Currently he lecturers in theology at the Catholic Theological College of Aotearoa New Zealand. Formerly, he served as

an educational officer (operatore didattico) in the Vatican Museums, Vatican City, and assistant professor of philosophy at Al Akhawayn University in Ifrane, Morocco. His academic specialities are the interdisciplinary study of theology and aesthetics, comparative theology, and ecclesial transformation in light of the current clerical sexual abuse crisis.

Te Whakatairanga i te Nohotahitanga o ngā Whakapono i Aotearoa Promoting Interfaith Relations in Aotearoa New Zealand

Promoting interfaith relations and interreligious dialogue among the diverse peoples of Aotearoa New Zealand at all levels is key to mutual understanding and thriving in our peaceful country. Pope Francis stated:

> "Interreligious dialogue is a necessary condition for peace in the world, and so it is a duty for Christians as well as other religious communities." (Evangelii Gaudium, 250.)

This workshop looks at the basic ideas behind interfaith relations and interreligious dialogue. Why dialogue? What is dialogue? What dialogue is not? Definitions of dialogue. It also considers the local Catholic Church's work in this field. It introduces the New Zealand Catholic Bishops' Committee for Interfaith Relations (NZCBCIR) – who we are, and what we do. Finally, it presents the Catholic Church's foundational teachings on interfaith and interreligious dialogue from the Second Vatican Council -Nostra Aetate and Lumen Gentium.

Pastoral Care. He has served for more than 10 years on Te Ropū Whakamāori (the National Liturgy Offices Māori translation team), the National Liturgy Advisory Group and Te Rūnanga Katorika o te Hāhi Katorika (the New Zealand Catholic Māori Council). He is a permanent Deacon, married to Marutakaiwaho, they have six children and seven mokopuna. He loves jazz music, a good yum cha and the ministry of the deaconate.

Māori Elements of Spirituality and Language for your kete

In the last two years the Archdiocese of Wellington has trialled in two pastoral areas 'Māori in the Liturgy'. This takes six key parts of the Mass and using an action method approach with te reo Maori, Māori Spirituality and tirohanga Māori - a Maori perspective.

Using humour and action method, be prepared to have a work out and experience and learn these Māori elements that can be put in your *kete*, taken away to be shared with your family, parish or school communities.

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Joe Green has been the Archdiocesan representative on the National Network of Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) . He is currently the Lay Pastoral Leader at the Catholic Parish of Wellington South. Joe thinks that we tend

to catechize before we evangelise. This makes him passionate about sharing the changes world-side in the RCIA: from a set 15 to 25 week "programme", to "initiation by and into a missionary faith community".

National Network of Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)

Jesus gave us the great **COMMAND**ment, and the great com**MISSION**. He told us how to live. The RCIA is the normative way we initiate people into the Christian life. This workshop will focus on parish community-based initiation in order that we can carry out Jesus' command and mission.
