programmes, and *Game On Dads* for Dads men's parenting workshops. CSS is also responsible for hospital and prison chaplaincy and the coordination of our clergy healthcare.

In line with further priorities of the 2017 synod, CSS has actively sought to collaborate with parishes and organisations with shared values. For example Changemakers Re-settlement Forum, Upper Hutt Benefit Educational Services

Trust, St Vincent de Paul, St Joseph's parish Levin and Our Lady Of Kāpiti parish, and Greenstone Doors.

We grew our volunteer programme with truly generous people who share their time, knowledge and experience to support our mahi and respond to the needs in our community.

After 18 years working in Catholic organisations which includes CSS, Compassion Soup Kitchen, and the Parish of Wellington South, I am

Weaving Community Connection

"It's really hard to meet the locals in New Zealand"

This is something we hear at CSS. Our mahi at CSS threads in a hospitality of welcome and encounter.

This way of being supports individuals and communities to make connections that counter the increasing isolation, loneliness, anxiety and polarisation many of us are witnessing in our community.

Deaf Community Workshops

From 11th July 2023, to 14th May 2024, community workshops were organized each month, for members of the Deaf Community at Petone Community House by CSS Social Work Navigator, Lyneen.

Speakers were invited to make presentations about their services which were followed by Q&A sessions with attendees.

Thanks to the generous support of the David Daily Charitable Trust, CSS was able to cover the costs of running the workshops, including engaging a NZSL interpreter to assist at each of the sessions.

Speakers included: Ian (CSS Senior Social Worker), Deirdre (CSS Com-

munity Facilitator), Sheryl (from My Life and My Voice), Tess (from MSD), Lauren (from Disabled Artists Festival of Theatre [Daft]), Karen (CCS Disability Action), Karen (WINZ Employment Consultant).

The workshops were very helpful for all those who participated.

Those presenting learnt first hand, some of the difficulties a Deaf person can face when trying to access their service.

Members of the Deaf community also learnt about services previously unknown to them and were able to put their questions to the providers directly.

Ethnic Communities Gathering

On Saturday 13 July 2024, Deirdre Meskill, along with Maya Bernardo from the Archdiocese, supported a gathering of Ethnic Communities. A welcome to the newly reopened Cathedral with Mass was followed by a workshop (pictured left) where diverse communities voiced their strengths and aspirations for the future. Seeds were sown with several practical ideas to grow and strengthen our communities further. The day was full of the enjoyment of coming
